According to City Engineer Brian Beck, prior to this phase of the Greenway, a sidewalk did not connect the south end of the Greenway path at Willow Street with the city sidewalk system. A sidewalk connector

from Willow Street along Brown Avenue, left onto 8th Street to Highland Avenue was constructed as part of Greenway phase III.
